What plans, if any, do you have to reduce the population of the Fulton County Jail?

Increase use of signature bonds; provide enhanced access to legal resources, such as the law library and counsel to facilitate speedy trials

Divert individuals through Sheriff Relief Program; explore a sheriff's release program; collaborate wth mental health organizations to release inmates deemed stable for outside treatment

Work with the DA and solicitor general to move cases; work with pretrial detention and diversion program; extend Sign Own Bonds for detained persons Meet with the municipal police chiefs of all cities to discuss charges that can be given citations with a court date; work with courts to get detainees released in under 24 hours

Two out of three Fulton County voters believe Fulton County should renovate the existing facility instead of spending nearly \$2 billion on a new jail and support using the savings to invest in alternatives to incarceration.

What plans do you have to improve the safety of the Fulton County Jail?

Reintroduce Compstat and Correctional Oriented Policing Strategies Review existing policies; provide additional training; and conduct security rounds every 30 minutes (15 minutes for mental health rounds)

Revamp the intake process to properly house gang members, LBTQIA+ people, persons needing medical care, and the mentally ill; ensure proper staffing;
